

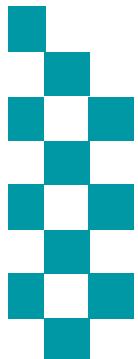

Supporting Projects and Activities:

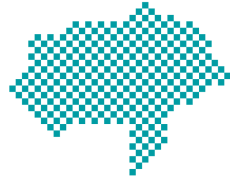
- Review and develop services that increase the safety of vulnerable people including:
 - Intelligence led police operations (such as Child Abuse Imaging Database [CAID], Cyber Crime Unit and resourcing current and historic child abuse cases)
 - Hate crime
 - No cold calling zone schemes
 - Other supporting initiatives such as 'No Wrong Door' project
- Governance
- Problem Profiles
- Action Plans
- Training



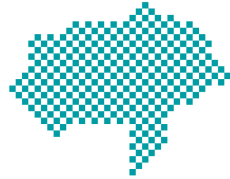
Develop new and existing services to vulnerable people

Supporting Projects and Activities :

- Work with partners to review and develop the safeguarding unit to establish an integrated Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH)
- In an average month
 - Attendance at strategy discussions for adult and children = 70
 - Attendance at Initial Child Protection Conference (ICPC) for children = 25
 - Total number of persons checked and reports compiled = 1519
 - Checks for Social Care = 104
- Missing from Home
- Offender Management Unit



- Assess third sector provision for vulnerable people and identify opportunities for consolidating services through commissioning, particularly in relation to child sexual abuse victims
- Work in partnership with NHS England and Yorkshire and the Humber forces to deliver a Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC) solution for which meets the needs of North Yorkshire victims:
 - Commission interim Adult SARC solution April 15-March 16
 - Commission Paediatric SARC solution from April 15
 - Commission regional Adult SARC solution from April 16
- Develop and commission a Domestic Abuse Referral Centre (DARC) solution to meet the needs of Domestic Abuse victims across North Yorkshire

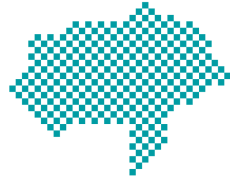


Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) support services for victims:

- **Time To project – MESMAC** (community based social wellbeing, sexual and mental health service) **& BASIS Yorkshire** (provides Safety, Information and Support to girls and young women at risk of sexual exploitation) - **March 2016-19**
 - Individual case management
 - 3 years funding via Big Lottery
 - Hub & spoke model – Hub in York at MESMAC
 - 3 x Workers - Scarborough & Ryedale; Harrogate; Selby & York
 - Richmondshire & Hambleton - provide advice & information service
- **NYP approach - commission a service for delivery in Hambleton & Richmondshire; & Craven from July 2016**
 - Continue working with Time To Project Coordinator to develop their service offer alongside development of NYP service specification to ensure consistency & quality of service across force area



- **Child Sexual Assault Assessment Service (CSAAS) – 2015-17:**
 - York Trust recruiting additional paediatrician which will increase CSAAS coverage from 70% - 80%
 - When York Trust are unable to provide an expert to deliver an examination, for acute cases, they will support victims to access a service in Humberside
 - 2017 & beyond – Reviewing options with 2 x Centres of Excellence NHS England's preferred model
- **Regional Adult Sexual Assault Referral Centre (SARC) - April 2016:**
 - Mountain Healthcare commenced delivery 1st April 2016
- **Pilot Self-Referral Service for Victims of Domestic Abuse:**
 - Final month of 6 month pilot delivered by IDAS (Support Services Charity) - November 2015
 - Initial results positive, 33% increase in self referrals in Harrogate & Hambleton following targeted campaigning
 - Interim Evaluation Report provided initial good practice examples
 - Full Evaluation by York St John University due by 31st May 2016

Supporting Projects:

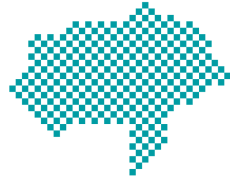
- Increase number of successful prosecutions for
 - sexual and domestic abuse, hate crime, and other vulnerable victims
- Support Crown Prosecution Services (CPS) and other agencies to deliver victim centred justice as swiftly as possible

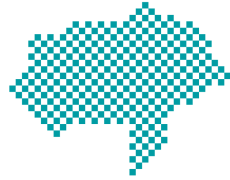

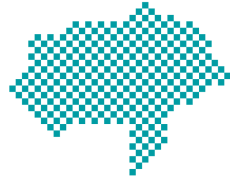
Crisis Care Concordat (CCC):

- Crisis Care Concordat signed 10th October 2014
- CCC action plan has 5 strands to co-ordinate improvement:
 - Earlier intervention and responsive crisis services
 - Access to support before crisis point
 - Urgent and emergency access to crisis care
 - Quality of treatment and care when in crisis
 - Recovery, staying well and preventing future crisis
- Change of governance recently led to meeting structure changes
- Last Gold Group meeting 3rd March – Police & Crime Commissioner, Deputy Chief Constable, Head of Commissioning & Partnerships and Mental Health Lead for NYP in attendance



Force Control Room (FCR) Mental Health Triage Service:

- FCR mental health triage service commenced Friday 15th January
- TEWV (Tees, Esk & Wear Valley - National Health Service) provide 1 x band 6 mental health nurse in FCR 10am – 10:30pm, Thursday to Sunday
- Extend service to 7 days a week following recruitment - 3 job offers accepted 21st March – mid May
- Triage service offers advice & guidance to NYP officers, staff & individuals they are involved with remotely, linking individuals with crisis teams & other mental health support where necessary
- Committed to funding FCR mental health triage service in 2016/17
- Data for the period 15th January to 17th March:
 - 22 shifts covered; 138 incidents
 - 46% (64) York; 24% (33) Scarborough; 15% (21) Harrogate; 8% (11) Northallerton; 4% (6) Selby
 - 83% (114 incident individuals) known to Mental Health (MH) services; 44% (61) open MH care plan in place



Mental Health Street Triage:

- Two TEWV Street Triage services currently in place – Scarborough & York
- Evaluation of street triage service benefits provides strong evidence base for continuation
- NYP/PCC commitment to fund Street Triage services in four Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) areas 2016/17
- CCGs have challenging financial savings to make in 2016/17
- TEWV superflow workshop March 2016 - 24/7, all age crisis service to be trialled in Scarborough
- Scarborough Street Triage to continue 2016-18 – delivery model to be agreed & underpinned by Service Level Agreement
- York Street Triage service has continued into 2016/17
- Street Triage service discussions in two other CCG areas ongoing
