

Performance Monitoring/Management and Operational Priorities

- At a strategic level this meeting (The Corporate Performance & Scrutiny Group) and Executive Board consider performance in the broader context of financial and people data and consider progress against the delivery of the Police and Crime Plan
- The force runs its Tactical Tasking & Co-ordination Group (TTCG) meeting on a 3 month cycle rather than monthly. This meeting looks predicted operational matters some 3 to 6 months in the future. Local TTCG meetings also run quarterly
- The Performance Steering Group now sits with the Operational Delivery Board meeting which also monitors progress against business plans and activity around HMIC inspections

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



Commentary on current position

- **Crime:** Victim Based Crime demand remains higher than normal and is being driven by volume rises in Criminal Damage & Violence. These changes appear to be reflected nationally and MSF.
- 70% of rise on last year came from comparisons with May and June 2014.
- In context NYP still has the lowest crime per 1000 population in England. Of note
 - Criminal Damage remains higher than normal for the third month in a row with a number of areas reporting rises across the force. Typically damage to dwellings have occurred by unknown offenders.
 - Violence remains higher than normal but factors such as increased compliance with National Crime Recording Standards (NCRS) and increased Victim Confidence (Domestic Abuse has increased) can impact the numbers. For Violence With Injury there appears to be a shift in offending within a dwelling rather than open/ space/hospitality. Alcohol remains a common factor with "Legal highs" also being identified as an underlying issue in Scarborough area
- **ASB** is down by 5% on last year. Demand in July was inline with normal expected levels. Movement within ASB categories likely linked to improved recording. Repeat victimisation linked to ongoing neighbour disputes housing associations aware and providing mediation.
- Ongoing major and serious crime investigation including the murder and attempt murder in York on 27th July (Op Overcast)
- Killed Seriously Injured (KSI) casualties: shows a reduction and the number recorded in June to be within normal range
- **Satisfaction:** Satisfaction remains high and trends for victims of Violence and Burglary are stable. A negative trend previously identified for victims of auto crime remains under scrutiny.
- This drop is linked to a change of deployment under the Thrive model (which has seen around 2000 officer hours freed up through crimes being dealt with over the phone) and appears to be linked to "management of expectations". Advice/guidance has been disseminated in the Force Control Room.
- Public Confidence: in police & partners remains high based on latest national dataset. NYP has not run a local community perception/confidence survey since 2010 following reductions in its budget.

Slide Summary

- This slide shows volume change across the last 3 years.
- **Victim Based Crime** is up on previous years with volume increases in
 - Arson & Criminal Damage
 - Violence
- Both these crime groups are in exception
- Despite these rises NYP remains having the lowest crime per 1000 population in England
- **ASB** is down on the previous year by almost 5%
- PSW volume trend is still rising year on year, and is by far the greatest inbound demand on NYP. The main volume of demand being Concern for Safety or reports of suspicious incidents

CRIME COMMENTARY

Commentary

- Commentary below relates to those crime types where the levels in July exceed normal range.
- **Violence** both With and Without Injury crimes are outside tolerance and there have been volume increases on the previous year of ~275 crimes.
- Whilst the local trend is upwards, this is also seen at a National and MSF level. Indications are that local rises are less than national average.
- Recent research published by Thames Valley Police using data from 43 forces indicated compliance with NCRS is seen as having an impact. Increased Victim Confidence to report can also impact with the rise in Domestic Abuse accounting for an additional 46 With & 66 Without Injury crimes.
 - **With Injury**. In context NYP has one of lowest rates per 1000 population.
 - Demand is highest on a weekend. Analysis of MO shows a rise in proportion of offences being committed within a dwelling and a downward trend in those being committed in open spaces or "hospitality" locations. Alcohol remains a key factor.
 - Increases mainly in Scarborough and York where problem solving plans remain in place around the Night Time Economy and Op ERASE and Op SAFARI continue to run.
 - Without Injury Harassment and Common Assault (often domestic related) are main crime types.
- **Criminal Damage** remains higher than normal for the third month in a row with increases across the county. Mostly damage to buildings. Low risk to victims and interms of repeat victimisation 10% of crimes can be linked to a victim suffering two or more crimes in 12 months but this drops to 4% linked to a victim suffering 3 or more crimes and 1% based on 5 or more. This indicates broadly that issues are being dealt with by SNTs
- The does not appear to be any greater number of crimes forming a series than usual i.e. a single or group of offenders damaging multiple pieces of property. Possible impact of Thrive deployment and compliance with 24 hour crime recording rule.
- Unknown offender being the predominant Modus Operandi (MO) for around 2/3 of crime.
- Nationally there appears to be a rise and in context NYP has lowest rate per 1000
- In August ACC Kennedy will be holding detailed performance conferences for the City of York district and Harrogate. This will consist of a presentation from the local command team followed by questions and discussion. The areas we will be discussing are performance information, quality of service, community engagement and feedback, partnerships, deployment and tasking of resources.
- Conferences in Scarborough and Northallerton are scheduled for late September.

- $\bullet \mbox{In Craven current}$ increases relate to Damage within Skipton Town and rise in ABH across the wider district.
- •In Harrogate the majority of the rise relates to shoplifting and a small number of stores account for a disproportionate amount of crime.
- •In Scarborough/Ryedale a rise in Damage as previously reported. There have been 13 robberies in last two months which is higher than usual and a number of those suspected or arrested are well known to police, in particular for ASB and drugs. Rise in Violence is influenced by increased reporting of domestics which can be viewed as positive. Alcohol is a common factor and legal highs increasingly so.
- •In York, Op ERASE and Op SAFARI remain in place. NYP are working closely with British Transport Police and other partners around the Night Time Economy and the impact of day visitors to York

- **ASB** is down on the previous year by almost 5%
- Current levels of ASB "Personal" are higher than usual however a significant amount of work has recently been done within the Force Control Room to ensure correct compliance with National Incident Standards (NSIR) and rises in Personal ASB are offset by falls within Nuisance ASB.
- Within the 28 days to 30 July there were 299 persons aggrieved or reporting ASB. Just 23 of these were repeats. An assessment of those with highest incident count reveals on going neighbour issues and in all cases the housing associations were aware and conducting or had conducted some form of mediation.

HR OVERVIEW

The Staff Budget has been adjusted for 2015/2016. Police staff roles fluctuate in accordance with organisational priorities and requirements. The approach to police staff workforce profiling is to explore opportunities where flexible resources can be utilised specifically to deliver key pieces of work.

The total number of actual Staff has increased by 3.56 FTE from the previous month.

The number of agency staff has increased by 3.52 FTE since the previous month:

17 x agency staff are in supernumerary posts.

14.74 x agency staff are backfill or interim postings against established posts (includes part time agency staff).

GLOSSARY

READING THE PERFORMANCE DATA

- The numbers shows performance against the previous year
- The dashboard graphic for operational crime, ASB and KSI data is an assessment of the latest month against a normal month based on the 2014/15 reporting period. The position of the needle describes the month results relative to a linear average. This allows for factors such as seasonal trends or the impact of single one off events to be explained. As the desired direction of travel can be up or down (e.g. increasing crime is negative but an increasing resolution % positive) the graphics alternate the red/green colouring accordingly.

GLOSSARY

- ASB = Anti-Social Behaviour
- Crimes Against Society = These are crimes which do not have a "named victim" i.e.. the offence is against The Crown. These are usually (but not always) are as the direct result of police intervention/proactivity e.g a drugs operation. In North Yorkshire & City of York approx 10% of crimes are "Against Society" therefore it is important to make the clear distinction from Victim Based Crime.
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring \underline{I} mmediate police response
- KSI = A casualty Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road
- MCU = <u>Major Crime Unit</u>
- MO = Modus Operandi
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- P&CP = Police & Crime Plan document setting out the Police & Crime Commissioner's priorities
- PCC = Police & Crime Commissioner
- PCSO = Police Community Support Officer
- PSG = Performance Steering Group is an internal meeting chaired by a Chief Officer monitoring statistics & trends
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- Sanction Detection = A historical method of looking at how crimes were resolved. A sanction detection includes where an offender is Charged, Cautioned, given a Penalty Notices for Disorder or Cannabis Warning or Fixed Penalty Notices, and where an offender has crimes Taken Into Consideration (TIC see below).
- TIC = <u>Taken Into Consideration</u> is typically where an offender admits to further offences to avoid potentially being pursued for these at a later date.
- TTCG = \underline{T} actical \underline{T} asking & \underline{C} o-ordination \underline{G} roup is an internal meeting which directs resources to tackle specific problems
