- Satisfaction remains high with more than 8 in 10 victims satisfied with service.

- For public confidence measures NYP performs well compared to similar forces and national averages.

Victim Based Crime

- The increases around property crime are largely caused by comparisons against low volumes in April 2016
- Criminal Damage – small increases in each district. No specific patterns. In the main a look at the MO data shows much of the crime is reported to NYP whereby “unknown” offenders have cause damage before “making off unseen/unheard”.

Long term trends

- The two long standing crime trends of note – an increase in recording of Sexual offences, and Violence without Injury.
- The trends are reflected nationally and have been reported on and discussed in previous meetings. The rises should not be seen as a negative but rather victims have confidence to come forward.

NYP'S TACTICAL RESPONSE

Rural Crime Task Force (RTF)

- **Pursue** – Op Countryside developed in Scarborough / Ryedale command to proactively tackle cross border crime issues. TID completed for Op Crackdown, which should score an OCG involved in rural crime. Op Sidekick relates to the intelligence led deployment of tracked assets across the force in conjunction with neighbouring forces and other agencies. Project ongoing to develop use of ANPR in rural locations. Significant wildlife prosecutions ongoing in respect of Raptor persecution and fox hunting, several of which are due in court over the coming months. Substantial theft of quad bikes in various areas, currently being looked at by team as a whole.
- **Prevent** – Visits and letters to those involved in suspect incidents, and those suspected of committing wildlife crime offences, such as poaching. Community reassurance work with partner agencies, including Volunteers from North York Moors, Yorkshire Dales and Angling Trust utilised for prevention message. CBO applications ongoing for wildlife and burglary offences, but outcomes awaited. Let's Learn Moor Project with BASC educated children from 11 different schools about the Moors and Wildlife Crime, which was part funded by Police Property Fund.
- **Protect** - Op Woollen continues, offering proactive prevention advice, CMS sign up, and preventative marking to North Yorkshire's 9000 farms,. This will soon be expanded to include rural businesses. Follow up visits to victims of crime, and those in surrounding area with view to prevent. Restructure of Rural Watch to Rural Patrol Volunteers under the Op Harvester banner. Pilot ongoing with five other forces to work on livestock worrying prevention, and potential legislative improvements. Targeted recruitment drive for CMS in future months looking at mapping our gaps in rural areas. Project with a technology company is involving a pilot scheme for preventative marking of sheep – their name "Op Bo-Peep".
- **Prepare** - Summer show programme has encompassed Tractor Fest at Newby Hall on 11th June, County Show at Bedale, and the Great Yorkshire Show at Harrogate, where officers engaged with numerous people, gathering intelligence and dispensing crime prevention advice. Officers have continued to attend auction marts, machinery sales, livery yards, etc. to engage with the public. Op Spartan, and riders' responsibilities events have been well attended, and the programme is now being developed further. Continued social media presence on Facebook and Twitter, with messages regularly achieving 5,000+ views. Internal recruitment campaign for Special Constables has brought three SC's to the RTF, starting 1st August, and this will be continued with an external transferee campaign, and a new SC campaign.

NYP'S TACTICAL RESPONSE

Operation Hawk

- Op Hawk is an NYP initiative to tackle travelling criminality and rural crime with the emphasis on the patrolling of our borders and targeting of vehicles and persons involved in criminal activities. In June the RCT have arrested 16 offenders recovered 3 stolen vehicles and seized 3 vehicles, the team has seized property to the value of £94'330 (Inc. Drugs, cash and stolen vehicles). The equivalent figures for the NARCT data is unavailable for June .
- The teams have seized property including Cash, Drugs and vehicles note:
 - While patrolling on Op Gamekeeper the RCT deploy to a ANPR activation looking for a vehicle involved in theft of diggers. The vehicle is stopped on the a66 and the driver was wanted on PNC for criminal damage by Leicester police.
 - The NARCT following a ANPR activation for a vehicle linked to theft attend Monks Cross, York. The vehicle was stopped and searched with over 60 exhibits were seized as suspected as stolen. Also seized were magnets, wire cutters leading the offender being arrested for going equipped.
 - The NARCT attend a report from a female that a male is in her home and she is concerned that the male will become violent. Initially the male is complaint but on speaking with officers he become more agitated, puts down a cup and leaps over towards the officer swinging a crow bar. The male is tasered which is effective and the male is arrested
- While not committed with their primary roles RPG/FSU/Dogs/RTF/NST deploy onto Op Hawk as well as supporting local policing, successes include:
 - FSU attend Kings Staithe, York following a report of a female in distress by the river. As officer approach the female she jumps into the river and is fully submerged. A officer runs to the end of the jetty, lay on his stomach and manages to grab the females fingers pulling her to safety. A ambulance attends and takes the female to YDH. The fast thinking of the officer prevented a possible worse outcome for the female.
 - RPG attend a report of 2 males breaking into a car. Officers attend along with a Dog officer and 2 males are located nearby. After enquiries are made a bag containing bolt croppers is found in a bin nearby and a witness identifies the 2 detained males as placing the bag in the bin. The 2 males were arrested for going equipped and TUMV.
 - A report of a female causes significant damage to a hospital then makes off in a vehicle. Local officers attend the home address of the female and when officers approach the female she moves towards the m with a knife in her hand. FSU officers then attend the address with firearms authority and find that in the address there is a large amount of blood, the female had barricaded herself I the bathroom and officers had to restrain and detain the female to administer emergency first aid due to significant wound to both of the female forearms. The prompt action of the AFO's was instrumental in saving life.

Operation Checkpoint

- Op Checkpoint is a Multi Force Operation whereby local officers along with Farm watch and NYP officers from all the Proactive teams carry out cross border patrols targeting cross border criminality and rural crime. The next Op Checkpoint date is in September 2017.

Other Operations

- **Op Attention** – Summer drink drive campaign, the first 7 days has seen 21 arrests for drink and drug related driving offences which is down from 31 during the same period last year. 9 have been drug related and 12 drink related. The highest breath alcohol reading so far has been 136ug/100ml (nearly 4 times the legal limit). So far 11 people have been charged to court. There are further show of force ops planned along with media activity.
- **Op Country side** - A proactive approach within the Scarborough and Ryedale command creating a hostile environment for those who wish to commit crime within our rural communities. The operation went live on the 30th May and by the 19th June there had been over 200hrs of dedicated patrolling leading to 1 arrest for possession of a class A drug, 4 x vehicle seizures, 5 x stop searches, 20 x vehicle stops and 60 PNC vehicle checks. The operation has received positive feedback from the rural communities.

- **Op Curve** fatal agricultural incident at Tadcaster. Investigation passed to HSE.
- **Op Conifer.** Murder investigation. York. 06/03/17. 19 year old male charged with murder and currently on remand.
- **Op Concise.** Murder investigation commencing 13/04/17 at Catterick. 51 year old male charged and currently remanded in custody.

June update:

- Performance continues to fluctuate each month., June performance , on the back of high demand, saw very high answer speeds and abandonment rates across both 999 and 101 lines.
- Current resourcing and performance matters are subject of a gold strategy meeting chaired by DCC Winward

In context:

- NYP remains one of the best performing forces for 999s according to BT
- Nationally forces are reporting increases in demand and longer wait times.
- Nationally there has been a 13% increase in 999 demand across all emergency services

GLOSSARY

Reading the performance data

- The numbers shows performance against the previous year
- The dashboard graphic for operational crime, ASB and KSI data is an assessment of the latest month against a normal month based on the 2016/17 reporting period. The position of the needle describes the month results relative to a linear average. This allows for factors such as seasonal trends or the impact of single one off events to be explained. As the desired direction of travel can be up or down (e.g. increasing crime is negative but an increasing resolution % positive) the graphics alternate the red/green colouring accordingly.

Glossary

- ASB = Anti-Social Behaviour
- CMS = Community Messaging System
- Crimes Against Society = These are crimes which do not have a “named victim” i.e.. the offence is against The Crown. These are usually (but not always) are as the direct result of police intervention/proactivity e.g a drugs operation. In North Yorkshire & City of York approx 10% of crimes are “Against Society” therefore it is important to make the clear distinction from Victim Based Crime.
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring ImmEDIATE police response
- KSI = A casualty Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road
- MCU = Major Crime Unit
- MO = Modus Operandi
- NPS = New PsychoaSive Substances is the official term for Legal Highs
- NTE = Night Time Economy
- NRCT = Northern Roads Crime Team – Roads Policing with some firearms capability
- NST = Neighbourhood Support Team – a specialist unit which is deployed around the force through tactical bidding process
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- P&CP = Police & Crime Plan document setting out the Police & Crime Commissioner’s priorities
- PCC = Police & Crime Commissioner
- PCSO = Police Community Support Officer
- PSG = Performance Steering Group is an internal meeting chaired by a Chief Officer monitoring statistics & trends
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- RPG = Roads Policing Team
- Sanction Detection = A historical method of looking at how crimes were resolved. A sanction detection includes where an offender is Charged, Cautioned, given a Penalty Notices for Disorder or Cannabis Warning or Fixed Penalty Notices, and where an offender has crimes Taken Into Consideration (TIC - see below).
- TIC = Taken Into Consideration is typically where an offender admits to further offences to avoid potentially being pursued for these at a later date.
- TTCG = Tactical Tasking & Co-ordination Group is an internal meeting which directs resources to tackle specific problems
