Money for policing – how it's spent 2017/18

North Yorkshire is one of the safest places to live in England and, as your Police and Crime Commissioner, I am determined to keep it that way.

In a public survey I carried out recently, two out of three respondents said they would prefer to increase the amount paid towards the police in our council tax.

This reflects the high levels of confidence in our force, which does a good job and needs our support.

This is why I have decided to increase the amount we all pay by 1.99 per cent. This will mean the average household will pay an extra 8p a week during 2017/18.


Money for policing

Your council tax bill includes a contribution towards North Yorkshire Police. Your Police and Crime Commissioner, Julia Mulligan, is responsible for setting the amount you pay. In a recent survey two out of three people said it should go up. In response she has increased it by 1.99 per cent – 8p a week more for the average Band D household.
