

Performance Monitoring/Management and Operational Priorities

- At a strategic level this meeting (The Corporate Performance & Scrutiny Group) and Executive Board consider performance in the broader context of financial and people data and consider progress against the delivery of the Police and Crime Plan
- The force runs its Tactical Tasking & Co-ordination Group (TTCG) meeting on a 3 month cycle rather than monthly. This meeting looks at predicted operational matters some 3 to 6 months in the future. Local TTCG meetings also run quarterly
- The Performance Steering Group now sits with the Operational Delivery Board meeting which also monitors progress against business plans and activity around HMIC inspections
- At a more local level the Assistant Chief Constable conducts quarterly Performance Reviews conferences which allow a more detailed assessment of localised operational and resourcing trends

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY



Summarised commentary on current trends

NB: The report has been "reset" for the new financial year. Comparisons with previous years for crime, ASB & PSW data is based on April only, large variances should be seen in context of Easter holidays and most of the May day bank holiday weekend falling within April 2017.

Crime & ASB

- NYP has the lowest crime rates per 1000 population in England.
- NYP has seen some volume increases in damage & some theft offences particularly shop theft,
- NYP have two long standing crime trends of note an increase in recording of "Other" (non rape) Sexual offences, and Violence without Injury.

Killed Seriously Injured (KSI) casualties

• Long term downward trend. Provisional figures for this calendar year show a reduction in casualties on the previous two years

Call Handling

- April saw small improvements on March position across all indicators.
- A peer review has recently been completed by Police Service Northern Ireland (PSNI) and NYP are looking to adopt the recommendations.

Satisfaction

- Satisfaction remains high with more than 8 in 10 victims satisfied with service.
- Data from the new survey of Victims of Domestic Violence is positive

Public Confidence

- The latest data show 83.9% of the public are confident in NYP
- For public confidence measures NYP performs well compared to similar forces and national averages.

Partnership working Improved working with York's two Universities focusing on the reporting of HATE crime and student involvement in the sex industry. OP TANSU will continue throughout 2017 whereby the local NPT are utilising data from MOSAIC to undertake proactive multi agency crime prevention & reassurance patrols. The op will target areas where there is either a real fear of crime or there has been a crime trend.

NYP'S TACTICAL RESPONSE

Rural Crime Task Force (RTF)

- **Pursue** – Identification of further cross border criminals who are potentially suitable for OCG scoring, and process. Deployment of tracked assets has led to several arrests, and this is being expanded with use of plant equipment loaned from PANIU. Ongoing Op Hawk and Op Checkpoint proactive patrols with other Proactive Policing resources working from ANPR. Support for Rogue Trader week of action through intelligence work and targeted enforcement of known vehicles / offenders. Project ongoing to develop use of ANPR in rural locations. Significant wildlife prosecutions ongoing in respect of Raptor persecution and fox hunting.
- **Prevent** Visits and letters to those involved in suspect incidents, and those suspected of committing wildlife crime offences, such as poaching. Community reassurance work with partner agencies, including Volunteers from North York Moors, Yorkshire Dales and Angling Trust utilised for prevention message.
- **Protect** Op Woollen continues, offering proactive prevention advice, CMS sign up, and preventative marking to North Yorkshire's 9000 farms, with 2000 sent to date and around a 15% response rate. This will soon be expanded to include rural businesses. Follow up visits to victims of crime, and those in surrounding area with view to prevent. Rural Watch patrols have continued throughout period, supported by RTF and NPT officers.. Pilot ongoing with five other forces to work on livestock worrying prevention, and potential legislative improvements.
- **Prepare** Summer show programme planned out for coming months, with Ripon Farm Services again providing a tractor which will be liveried. Officers have continued to attend auction marts, machinery sales, livery yards, etc. to engage with the public. Continued social media presence on Facebook and Twitter, with messages regularly achieving 5,000+ views. Various partners have been identified who can assist with addressing wellbeing of rural communities, and literature produced to be distributed with Op Woollen roll out. Recruitment campaign for Special Constables ongoing.

NYP'S TACTICAL RESPONSE

Operation Hawk

- Op Hawk is an NYP initiative to tackle travelling criminality and rural crime with the emphasis on the patrolling of our borders. In April the RCT have arrested 5 offenders recovered 4 stolen vehicles and seized 4 vehicles, the team has seized property to the value of £60,610 (Inc. Drugs, cash and stolen vehicles). The NARCT have arrested 11 offenders, recovered stolen vehicles and seized 20 vehicles. Together the teams have seized property including Cash, Drugs and vehicles to over the value of £86,000 Of note:
 - RCT deploy in response to 3 x males seen to be acting suspiciously. ANPR then notes a Mercedes reported stolen from SYP on the A19. Units deploy and see the Mercedes leave the area followed in convoy by a Vauxhall Insignia also stolen. Both vehicles were pre-emptively stung, 3 suspects make off but are located and arrested in nearby fields.
 - The NARCT receive information regards a high value shop theft at the Apple store, Meadowhall, Sheffield. The vehicle is sighted on the A1 at Boroughbridge, pre-emptive tactics were used and 2 Eastern Europeans were arrested. Stolen items were recovered
 - The NARCT respond to a report of an female in distress in a vehicle being driven by an aggressive male. The vehicle is located and stopped. Information received that the male driver is dealing drugs and a search is carried out were £7000 cash was found. The male is arrested for suspicion of money laundering. After enquiries carried out the arrested male is suspected of being a drug runner linked to OCG's.
- While not committed to their primary roles Proactive Policing deploy onto Op Hawk as well as supporting local policing, successes include:
 - RPG attend a report of an vehicle on the A19 with its light out and the driver appeared very drunk. RPG respond and locate a black Passat which is driving erratically with no light on. The vehicle is stopped and the male driver failed the road side breath test. Within the vehicle were his 3 children aged 10hrs, 6yrs and 4yrs. The male was also arrested for child neglect.
 - RPG see a SMV in the Knaresborough area. RPG locate the vehicle on the Broadacres estate in the Harrogate area and the vehicle is confirmed stolen after not being returned after hire, both male occupants arrested.
 - RPG attend a report of an distressed male at Barton Lorry park, at the location a 16 year old male from Iraq was detained for being unlawfully at large in the UK and taken to a place of safety. Immigration were contacted.
 - FSU respond to an ANPR hit for a vehicle and possible occupant being wanted for Domestic Violence related threats to kill. The
 wanted male was arrested and a search was carried out within the vehicle due to a smell of cannabis resulting in a large Machete, a
 large kitchen knife, 2 x balaclavas and suspected Class A and B drugs being found. The female passenger was also arrested.

Operation Checkpoint

• Op Checkpoint is a Multi Force Operation whereby local officers along with Farm watch and NYP officers from all the Proactive teams carry out cross border patrols along NYP's Northern Border. There will be 4 Op Checkpoints carried out this financial year the next date 18th May

Other Operations

- **Multi-Agency Op** Joint police/DVSA carry out a dangerous goods check on the A19 Exelby. 13 CDG vehicles checked and 4 CDG LGV's resulting in 2 x Advisory notices issued, 1 x delayed prohibition for safety equipment, 1 x prohibition Con and Use, 1 x prohibition Tachograph, and 1 x TOR.
- **Op Symbol** NST carry out 3 x section 8 PACE warrants in relation to drug supply and the Rape of an vulnerable female. The operation resulted on 3 x arrests and cash and drugs recovered.

- **Gross negligence manslaughter investigation**. Craven area. Male Sentenced to 49 months in total for cannabis cultivation, possession of indecent images and the wilful neglect.
- Op Curve fatal agricultural incident at Tadcaster. Investigation jointly with HSE.
- Op Conifer. Murder investigation. York. 06/03/17. 19 year old male charged with murder and currently on remand.
- Op Concise. Murder investigation commencing 13/04/17 at Catterick. 51 year old male charged and currently remanded in custody.

GLOSSARY

Reading the performance data

- The numbers shows performance against the previous year
- The dashboard graphic for operational crime, ASB and KSI data is an assessment of the latest month against a normal month based on the 2015/16 reporting period. The position of the needle describes the month results relative to a linear average. This allows for factors such as seasonal trends or the impact of single one off events to be explained. As the desired direction of travel can be up or down (e.g. increasing crime is negative but an increasing resolution % positive) the graphics alternate the red/green colouring accordingly.

Glossary

- ASB = Anti-Social Behaviour
- CMS = Community Messaging System
- Crimes Against Society = These are crimes which do not have a "named victim" i.e.. the offence is against The Crown. These are usually (but not always) are as the direct result of police intervention/proactivity e.g a drugs operation. In North Yorkshire & City of York approx 10% of crimes are "Against Society" therefore it is important to make the clear distinction from Victim Based Crime.
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring Immediate police response
- KSI = A casualty Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road
- MCU = Major Crime Unit
- MO = Modus Operandi
- NPS = \underline{N} ew \underline{P} sychoactive \underline{S} ubstances is the official term for Legal Highs
- NTE = Night Time Economy
- NRCT = Northern Roads Crime Team Roads Policing with some firearms capability
- NST = Neighbourhood Support Team a specialist unit which is deployed around the force through tactical bidding process
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- P&CP = Police & Crime Plan document setting out the Police & Crime Commissioner's priorities
- PCC = Police & Crime Commissioner
- PCSO = <u>P</u>olice <u>Community Support Officer</u>
- PSG = Performance Steering Group is an internal meeting chaired by a Chief Officer monitoring statistics & trends
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- RPG = Roads Policing Team
- Sanction Detection = A historical method of looking at how crimes were resolved. A sanction detection includes where an offender is Charged, Cautioned, given a Penalty Notices for Disorder or Cannabis Warning or Fixed Penalty Notices, and where an offender has crimes Taken Into Consideration (TIC - see below).
- TIC = <u>Taken Into Consideration</u> is typically where an offender admits to further offences to avoid potentially being pursued for these at a later date.
- TTCG = \underline{T} actical \underline{T} asking & \underline{C} o-ordination \underline{G} roup is an internal meeting which directs resources to tackle specific problems
