Overview of Operation Kingfisher

- Our aim is to ensure that North Yorkshire Police provides a consistent and co-ordinated policing response to any hydraulic fracturing (fracking) related protest activity, fulfilling our core responsibilities and conducting ourselves in a manner compatible with the values of North Yorkshire Police and the Code of Ethics.
- We will continue to facilitate fundamental Human Rights around 'Peaceful Protest' by supporting and protecting those engaging in it and taking account of their rights to freedom of expression, assembly and association.
- We will do this whilst balancing the needs and rights of the wider public, local communities (residential, visiting, and business) and the rights of all, including the Energy companies, to go about lawful and peaceful activities.
- We are responding proportionately to any protest activity so related to hydraulic fracturing. Although we are focused on this operation, it is still '**business as usual**' elsewhere for North Yorkshire Police, and people can be reassured that we will be attending to our usual duties and continuing to provide a high quality service across North Yorkshire and the City of York.





Overview of Operation Kingfisher

Third Energy have completed phases one and two and are currently in phase three - hydraulic fracture stimulation. Until Third Energy receive the final approval from the government, there is a reduced police presence at the site due to the decrease in commercial activity and protest activity.

1. Noise Attenuation Barrier - complete

2. Pre-Stimulation Workover - complete

3. <u>Hydraulic Fracture Stimulation</u> – ongoing

4. Production Test

We always respond proportionately to any protest activity, so when it is peaceful and safe, we can reduce the number of officers at Kirby Misperton, and redeploy them to policing duties elsewhere in North Yorkshire.

On many days in January 2018, the only officers present at the site were a few Police Liaison Officers, whose role it is to engage with the protest community. They were also redeployed back to their areas when there was no protest activity.





Additional costs

The table below shows the additional costs relating to the policing operation at Kirby Misperton. This includes overtime, equipment, subsistence, travel-related costs etc. These costs do not include the cost of those officers that are assigned to policing the site on a day-to-day basis. The additional costs were higher in October, as it was the first full month of the operation. January 2018 costs are down 17 per cent compared with December 2017.
