

Summarised commentary on current trends

Crime & ASB

 NYP have two long standing crime trends of note – an increase in recording of Sexual offences, and Violence without Injury and recently there has been some volume increases in Criminal Damage, Vehicle Offences and Shop Theft. However in context, a comparison with Most Similar Forces (MSF) shows NYP generally ranks 1st or 2nd for these crime types

Killed Seriously Injured (KSI) casualties

• Long term downward trend. <u>Provisional figures</u> for this calendar year show a reduction in casualties on the previous two years

Call Handling

• An update on current FCR Performance is elsewhere on this Agenda

Satisfaction

- Satisfaction remains high with 8 in 10 victims satisfied with service.
- Data from the new survey of Victims of Domestic Violence remains positive

- Shop Theft most significant rise at York with an increase of 381 offences on 16/17
- Vehicle Offences increase of 278 on 16/17 – 144 of these occurring in the Selby SNC

Long term trends

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- The two long standing crime trends of note – an increase in recording of Sexual offences, and Violence without Injury. These remain below MSF trends
 - The trends are reflected nationally and have been reported on and discussed in previous meetings. The rises should not be seen as a negative but rather victims have confidence to come forward.

NYP'S TACTICAL RESPONSE

Rural Crime Task Force (RTF)

• People

One current gap in the Scarborough district following promotion. Campaign to recruit Specials ongoing, with a view to replicate structure of PC's and PCSO's. Mobile Watch schemes are planned for Ryedale, Craven, York areas, and recruitment of Volunteers will progress through the year

Proactivity

Dates are planned for Op Galileo (poaching), Op Woollen (prevention), Op Byway (illegal off roading), up to Spring 2018. Operation Checkpoint is planned in on a quarterly basis throughout 2018, the first such date being in March 2018. Other operations targeting wildlife crime, in particular raptor persecution planned during early months of 2018. Daily business targets tackling border vulnerabilities highlighted by intelligence work. Op Sidekick continues to proactively target cross border acquisitive criminals through intelligence work.

Productivity

Various people reported for poaching offences, as well as vehicles /dogs seized through Op Galileo, and use of dispersal orders under Anti Social Behaviour legislation given where possible. Active investigations ongoing into equine crime, raptor persecution and hunting offences. Op Harvester is established now to capture the work carried out by mobile rural watch schemes.

Problem Solving

Problem Solving plans written for raptor persecution, border vulnerabilities and rural crime, which are now being worked towards completion. Op Byway, Galileo, Woollen and Sidekick all address problems identified on area. Op Sage – force organised hunting response, aims to prevent issues occurring between hunts and saboteurs. Op Exceed is our response to equine crime, a PSP has been written, which will take a holistic approach to dealing with acquisitive crime in this field. Partnership working groups have been established with all councils to provide a response to fly tipping.

Public Service

Training events planned with Yorkshire Dales and North Yorks Moors National Parks which will develop joint working processes, and improve public awareness of rural and wildlife crime in the voluntary sector. Further training to be planned in with FCR colleagues post May 2018. Show calendar for 2018 planned, starting with Ripon Farm Services new year event in January, with smaller events being planned in locally with officers. Traditional media, newsletters, and social media presence on Facebook and Twitter, to continue liaising with public.

NYP'S TACTICAL RESPONSE

Operation Hawk

- An NYP initiative to tackle travelling criminality and rural crime with the emphasis on the patrolling of our borders and targeting of vehicles and persons involved in criminal activities. In January the FSU, OSU and RPG Proactive Policing teams have carried out over 910hrs of Proactive Patrol time and while doing so attending 9 Crime in progress reports.
- Along with carrying out Proactive patrols targeting the forces border vulnerabilities the Proactive Policing teams assist with spontaneous reactive incidents, during January the teams have been redeployed by Silver 69 times and given assistance to R&R and SNT at 59 incidents.
 - RPG and OSU officers identify a vehicle linked to cross border crime and a number of suspect incidents. Officer deploy to strategic location and the suspect vehicle is sighted and a pursuit ensues, reaching speeds in excess of 120mph. After a long pursuit through SYP area and Humberside area the vehicle eventually comes to a stop, 4 occupants decamp and NPAS is deployed and all 4 occupants located and detained.
 - FSU respond to an ANPR hit on a white Golf on the A64. Due to information received the vehicle and occupants were searched and 17 wraps of heroin was found in a container in the boot of the vehicle, all 4 occupants were arrested for PWITS and TWOC as none of the males stated that the vehicle was theirs.
 - OSU whilst travelling back from a High Risk missing person search at Skipton, respond to a Peugeot 307 in suspicious circumstances in Harrogate. The vehicle when makes off and a pursuit ensues resulting in the vehicle being lost. After continual searches carried out the vehicle is located abandoned in the Harrogate area and a vehicle search is carried out and a air weapon was seized.
 - RPG officers attend a report of an Polish HGV travelling North A1M, were 2 persons were seen to be in the trailer. The vehicle was stopped and 2 Afghan origin males were arrested for being unlawfully at large in the UK, with one of the male also arrested for criminal damage.
 - FSU deploy to as a report of a SMV from the Lancashire area travelling on the A59. Searches were carried out and the vehicle was sighted on the A61 at Ripon. The vehicle was stopped and found to be on cloned plates and stolen within the last 24 hours. 2 occupants were arrested without incident.
 - OSU are tasked with two premises searches following the arrests of 2 OCG members linked to committing thefts while operating as employees. As a result over 60 items were seized crucial to the investigation which included electronic devices, paperwork and stolen property with an estimated value over £7500.

As well as responding and dealing with Proactive Patrol stops and incidents the Proactive teams also give assistance to R&R and SNT with reactive incidents. Of note:

- FSU attend a report of an domestic incident at Elvington where it was reported that a male had a knife and was threatening his partner. The male is safely detained and arrested for affray.
- RPG officer attends a report of 3 males one with a 10" knife, when RPG officer arrives with Taser the male hands over the knife without incident and a further male arrested for Sect 47 assault.
- OSU monitor 2 reports of thefts at a shop in Northallerton. Officers make the area and deploy at strategic location around the area and after the vehicle is sighted a stop search is carried out were a large amount of stolen property was located and recovered, the 2 occupants were arrested.

Other Operations

- **Op Kingfisher** Community reassurance in relation to High profile anti fracking protests around Kirby Misperton.
- **Multi Agency Training Op** OSU, RPG attend and assist in a training operation of an Major incident RTC working with the fire and ambulance service as well civilian volunteers. The operation provided valuable learning opportunities showing excellent combined working practices.

NOTABLE INVESTIGATIONS

- **Op Estonia** particularly distressing case. Murder investigation following the death of a female in Skipton on 22/12/17. Suspect charged and remanded
- Following on from the above, staff were then called to Cleveland on Christmas Day to assist colleagues in Middlesborough following a murder late on Christmas Eve in the area. Male charged with murder and carrying an offensive weapon.
- **Op Essence** Claudia LAWRENCE Male arrested in Brighton Area, for harassment type offences.
- **Op Aquamarine** murder investigation following the death of a 17 year old male in Guisborough on 27/08/17 investigation led by NYP officers. Guilty plea accepted. Sentenced to 6.5 years for manslaughter on 26/01/18.
- **Op Coriander** Possible offence of medical manslaughter involving an elderly male.
- **Op Drone** attempted murder and kidnap are being investigated following review of serious RTC in York.
- **Op Europe** stranger rape of female in York. Suspect arrested, charged and currently on remand.

- Harrogate SNC significant rises in Criminal Damage crimes, specifically in the Boroughbridge area relating to Vehicle and Dwelling Damage. OP Creature, led by Local NPT seeks to reduce the damage and ASB that young groups can cause by a combination of targeted patrol, enforcement and multi agency safeguarding work.

- **Richmondshire ASB Actions** Richmondshire District Council are progressing with the PSPO for the Colburn area, and have consulted with the public. The response to their survey was encouraging, with 578 responses received. 59% of those who replied thought the PSPO would have a positive impact on those living and working in the Colburn area. Local Police have been asked to provide reassurances around any displacement of crime and ASB, and also the ability to assist RDC in the enforcement of the PSPO. The local Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) will be able to monitor this order, and they will be minded to identify any displacement at the earliest opportunity.
- **OP CORNISH** targeting crimes in the centre of Scarborough centred on drug dealing. Specifically aimed at theft and associated ASB.

## GLOSSARY

## Reading the performance data

- The numbers shows performance against the previous year
- The dashboard graphic for operational crime, ASB and KSI data is an assessment of the latest month against a normal month based on the 2016/17 reporting period. The position of the needle describes the month results relative to a linear average. This allows for factors such as seasonal trends or the impact of single one off events to be explained. As the desired direction of travel can be up or down (e.g. increasing crime is negative but an increasing resolution % positive) the graphics alternate the red/green colouring accordingly.

## Glossary

- ASB = <u>Anti-Social Behaviour</u>
- CMS = Community Messaging System
- Crimes Against Society = These are crimes which do not have a "named victim" i.e.. the offence is against The Crown. These are usually (but not always) are as the direct result of police intervention/proactivity e.g a drugs operation. In North Yorkshire & City of York approx 10% of crimes are "Against Society" therefore it is important to make the clear distinction from Victim Based Crime.
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring Immediate police response
- KSI = A casualty <u>Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road</u>
- MCU = <u>Major C</u>rime <u>U</u>nit
- MO = <u>M</u>odus <u>O</u>perandi
- NPS = <u>New P</u>sychoactive <u>Substances</u> is the official term for Legal Highs
- NTE = <u>N</u>ight <u>T</u>ime <u>E</u>conomy
- NRCT = <u>N</u>orthern <u>R</u>oads <u>C</u>rime <u>T</u>eam Roads Policing with some firearms capability
- NST = <u>N</u>eighbourhood <u>Support Team a specialist unit which is deployed around the force through tactical bidding process</u>
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- P&CP = Police & Crime Plan document setting out the Police & Crime Commissioner's priorities
- PCC = <u>Police & C</u>rime <u>C</u>ommissioner
- PCSO = <u>Police Community Support Officer</u>
- PSG = <u>Performance Steering Group is an internal meeting chaired by a Chief Officer monitoring statistics & trends</u>
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- RPG = <u>R</u>oads <u>P</u>olicing <u>T</u>eam
- Sanction Detection = A historical method of looking at how crimes were resolved. A sanction detection includes where an offender is Charged, Cautioned, given a Penalty Notices for Disorder or Cannabis Warning or Fixed Penalty Notices, and where an offender has crimes Taken Into Consideration (TIC see below).
- TIC = <u>Taken Into Consideration</u> is typically where an offender admits to further offences to avoid potentially being pursued for these at a later date.
- TTCG = <u>Tactical Tasking & Co-ordination Group is an internal meeting which directs resources to tackle specific problems</u>

### Police Officers
