





#### Average Officers Dispatched Per Occ Jan '19




#### Mode of Transport Jan '19








#### **Highest Wards by Crime Volume**






#### **Coastal Command (Incidents and Crimes January 2019 – Scarborough and Ryedale)**




#### Incident Volumes by Day and Time Group



#### **Highest Wards by Crime Volume**




#### Split of Crime by Type








#### Split of 532 hours apportioned to FSU





#### **Rural Task Force – January 2019**

#### Prevention

Op Woollen continues to offer proactive prevention advice to all farms in North Yorkshire. Op Woodchip owned by PCSOs on area offering prevention to rural businesses. Regular property marking schemes being conducted by PCSOs at rural business, sports clubs, livery yards, auction marts, etc. Follow up visits and enquiries to victims of crime, and those at risk in the vicinity following criminal activity.

Mobile Rural Watches, run under the Op Harvester banner continue to enable communities to prevent crime in their own area through joint work with local officers, and better informing those areas. Some of the MRW's are the first users of police / public WhatsApp groups, enabling information to pass quicker from both sides.

PCSOs from the team have adopted the national Op Crucible to prevent theft of lead from churches and other vulnerable rural locations, in response to recent crime trends.

A weekend of action is planned for Op Owl (raptor persecution) with agencies and local landowners.

#### Intelligence

Intelligence collection plans are in place for two new OCGs, Op Extractor and Op Existence, which include various partners, and open source work. Regional poaching top targets are established, along with an intelligence collection plan, so these travelling criminals can be tackled with a joined up approach.

RTF contribute to tackling OCGs identified by the National Wildlife Crime Unit, by work within North Yorkshire and the Region.

WhatsApp groups set alongside Mobile Rural Watches, are starting to deliver live time intelligence to officers.

#### Enforcement

The most recent Op Checkpoint was run by RTF in February alongside 5 other northern forces, with numerous officers, staff and volunteers involved, leading to a number of arrests and reports. Further dates are already planned for 2019.

There are two large scale investigations ongoing into OCGs Extractor and Existence, which require considerable officer time, but are in response to serious rural problems. Local investigation teams are assisting.

Dates are planned into 2019 for Op Galileo (poaching), Op Eyeball (fly-tipping and trading standards offences).

Recent arrests have been made for burglaries and thefts, and there are numerous smaller investigations which are owned by team members.

#### Reassurance

RTF resources continue to use a variety of channels to communicate with the public, which is established as business as usual.

These include social media, especially Twitter and Facebook, local print media and TV – check out Countryfile soon!

RTF have attended numerous local events since the start of the year, including most recently York Agricultural Mart.


Events have been held with local Watch groups to provide further training and relevant police messages (e.g. Barclays came to a group to talk about fraud awareness).

#### Incidents dispatched to assist






#### Crimes currently under investigation
