PCC CFO	30 September 2019	The Financial Regulations were reviewed and no substantive revisions were required. The Contract regulations were subject to some refinement following some internal audit activity. These shall be subject to further review over time to closer align the provisions of the PCC arrangements and those of NY Fire and Rescue Service
2. Monitor the implications for the governance framework arising from changes to both police sector collaboration and collaboration with the fire and rescue service.	CEO	31 December 2019	Appropriate provisions have been made with a discrete Code of Corporate Governance prepared for the s.4 Fire Authority. Since the transfer of governance of North Yorkshire Fire and Rescue Service (NYFRS) to the North Yorkshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Fire and Rescue Authority, work has been developing as part of the transitional arrangements to include the public scrutiny and accountability of NYFRS within the PAM. Therefore, steps are being taken to ensure the topics covered within the PAM meetings include themes from both the Police and Crime Plan priorities for North Yorkshire Police (NYP) and the Fire and Rescue Plan priorities for NYFRS. Currently, the Fire and Rescue Plan is in production and is at consult

			phase for publication in April 2019. The PAM Terms of Reference are being updated to include scrutiny and accountability across service delivery for both NYP and NYFRS and to ensure items within the agenda such as the performance packs and service oversight are designed to satisfy appropriate scrutiny by the Commissioner, with the public in mind. In light of recent changes and transitional work, the new ways of working for PAM are being developed with a target implementation of 30 April 2019 to ensure that the necessary work is carried out to include the scrutiny and accountability role of PAM within amended Terms of Reference. These Terms of Reference will make reference to the role of PAM in scrutinising the Police and Crime Plan and the Fire and Rescue Plan moving forwards.
3. Refine the process for reporting on benefits realisation to ensure an appropriate level of oversight and awareness	CEO	31 March 2019	Development of local benefits realisation and management practices is being undertaken in two main strands. Firstly the National Police Chiefs Council (NPCC) has a Business Change Council a group of which has a "benefits realisation" sub group that senior North Yorkshire Police colleagues attend. As part of that work there is a "Benefits Realisation Practitioner Group" which we are actively engaged with. The aim of the national benefits realisation work is to develop a common set of agreed principles and approach.

			Secondly benefits realisation is one of the areas of work that has been considered within the Transformation work.
4. Monitor the implementation of management action arising from audit and inspection outcomes on Data Quality and Crime Data Integrity to ensure improvement in those areas.	DCC	31 March 2019	Oversight of both Crime Data Integrity and Data Quality has been monitored through the Crime Data Integrity Improvement Group. Good progress has been made in relation to the action plan. In late January the Force publicised the fact that the crime data integrity improvement had contributed to a 13% rise in recorded crime in North Yorkshire following the publication of the Office of National Statistics' (ONS) bulletin "Crime in England in Wales, year ending September 2018". An upward adjustment in the crime figures was expected on the back of the extensive program of work that has been undertaken to improve crime recording processes. This included a dedicated team that was put together to drive the necessary changes, which has seen a roll-out of additional guidance for officers and staff and within the Force Control Room.
