

## **Mental Health**

#### Occurrences involving a person(s) with a mental health qualifier



- The monthly volume of incidents where Mental Health is seen as a factor involved remains static with the exception of January 2018 and Summer 2018 where we saw a rise in incidents.
- Incidents with a Mental Health tag have accounted for 8.6% of all incidents in the last 22 months



#### Use of police custody as a place of safety

Police custody must only be used for s.136 MHA detainees in highly exceptional circumstances, e.g. genuinely unmanageable risks of resistance, aggression, violence or escape, or if also detained for an offence. We scrutinise every use of custody in these circumstances. Further details are included on the following slide.




#### Gender/Age Breakdown and Repeat Nominals

- April 2019 saw another decrease in s136 detentions when compared to the monthly average experienced (average 26 incidents per month over the last 2 years)
- Due to the closure of the HBPoS at Northallerton 2 detainees were taken out of area to a HBPoS in Middlesbrough. These 2 incidents averaged 506.52 mins, so a reduction of 2.5 hours was required for each of these occurrences compared to other suites.
- 0 individuals had repeat s136 detentions in March 2019.
- 7 incidents required Police transportation:
  - 5 following Risk assessment
  - 1 due to no Ambulance being available within 30 mins
  - 1 No reason recorded




## Force Levels (Incidents and Crimes Committed April 2019)









#### Count of all Incidents and type











- The stats above represent only 1 month compared to 1 month, as the Financial Year passes, the trends will become available.





## Split of 481 hours appointed to OSU



## **Rural Task Force**

#### Caring for the Vulnerable

Work ongoing with Victim Support to increase referrals from rural victims of crime.

Collaboration with NHS, Farming Community Network, Yorkshire Agricultural Society and others to improve relevant signposting to mental health services.

Op Woollen, Op Woodchip and Op Crucible aim to provide proactive prevention advice to farms, businesses and historic assets at risk.

Property Marking Events are regularly held to provide reassurance and a deterrent against theft.

#### Ambitious Collaboration

Operation Checkpoint carried out in May with five other forces - 100+ officers and 100+ volunteers involved. Further dates planned in Q3 and Q4. Checkpoint is seen as a template to develop a national rural week of action later in the year.

Other multi force operational dates for cross border operations set with Cleveland, Durham and Lancs.

Local meetings with neighbouring forces occur monthly between PC's / PCSO's on area, and neighbouring force NPT's. to share intelligence and operational activity.

Op Owl dates planned for later in the year tackling raptor persecution with partners and land owners.

Op Eyeball dates planned throughout rest of year with local authorities, DVSA, DVLA and NYP RPG to tackle potential fly-tipping offenders. National Park Authorities and AONB in NYP collaborate with RTF on various work streams including tackling wildlife crime, and use of volunteers.

Collaboration with 3 forces nationally to develop a What Works strategy around poaching.

RTF colleagues chair regional rural crime group, as well as being involved in national projects to shape rural policing.

Work ongoing with partners to disrupt criminal activity of OCG's especially Existence, involving National Food Crime Unit.

Work planned with Firearms Licensing to improve prevention to potential vulnerable sites in NY.

#### **Reinforcing Local Policing**

Identify and support local priorities including Op Night (Craven), Op Meteor (Selby) and Op Cargo (County).

Op Sidekick is an intelligence led operation to proactively tackle plant and machinery theft through a series of tactics, and continues.

Op Extractor investigation and proactive response to a series of burglaries and thefts in the north of the county, as well as OCG management.

Op Existence investigation into livestock theft and subsequent sale, OCG management and working with partners such as NFCU to tackle OCG.

#### Enhancing Customer Experience

Op Harvester works with volunteers based in community groups to actively work with local officers to tackle rural criminality in their areas. There are now sixteen across North Yorkshire comprising 200+ PSV's.


WhatsApp has recently been piloted as a tool to improve communication between community groups and the police. This has been successful in one area, and is being rolled out into 2 others.

Numerous local events are still being attended on area, ranging from shows, to local marts, to farm open days, enabling contact, engagement with, and information flow between the tam and rural public.

Internal Sharepoint site is being developed to communicate the work of RTF to police colleagues.

## GLOSSARY

#### Glossary

- ASB = <u>A</u>nti-<u>S</u>ocial <u>B</u>ehaviour
- CMS = Community Messaging System
- Concern Safety = Concern for Safety includes all occurrences where there is a concern for an individuals safety or welfare
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- FSU = Firearms Support Unit
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring Immediate police response
- KSI = A casualty Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road
- MCU = <u>Major Crime Unit</u>
- Miss Pers = Missing Person
- MO = <u>M</u>odus <u>O</u>perandi
- NPS = <u>New P</u>sychoactive <u>Substances</u> is the official term for Legal Highs
- NTE = <u>N</u>ight <u>T</u>ime <u>E</u>conomy
- OCG = Organised Crime Group
- OSU = Operational <u>Support Unit a specialist unit which is deployed around the force through tactical bidding process</u>
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- PCSO = <u>P</u>olice <u>C</u>ommunity <u>S</u>upport <u>O</u>fficer
- PSW = Personal Safety and Welfare
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- RPG = <u>R</u>oads <u>P</u>olicing <u>T</u>eam
- RTF = Rural Task Force
- SNC = Safer Neighbourhood Command Area of Policing attributed to
- Sus Circs = Suspicious Circumstances includes Insecure premises and Vehicles
- TIC = <u>Taken Into Consideration</u> is typically where an offender admits to further offences to avoid potentially being pursued for these at a later date.
