



# Mental Health

## Occurrences with a mental health qualifier



- There has been a dip in Mental Health related incidents this month. As a result of the extended use of the auto tag facility used by the FCR, this has increased the number of mental health qualifiers applied since May 2020.
- Incidents with a Mental Health tag have accounted for 17.33% of all incidents in the last 23 months and have accounted for 20.97% of all incidents in December 2020.



## Use of police custody as a place of safety

Police custody must only be used for s136 MHA detainees in highly exceptional circumstances, e.g. genuinely unmanageable risks of resistance, aggression, violence or escape, or if also detained for an offence. We scrutinise every use of custody in these circumstances.

**The below volumes have been reviewed and changed. Previously any s136 detention that occurred in custody has been counted, however, all but the below incidents, custody was not actually used as a place of safety. The incident occurred whilst in custody before the individual was transferred to a recognised Health Based Place of Safety and as such custody was never used as a Place of Safety. In these cases, the mental ill-health of the detainee was identified after their arrival at a custody suite.**




## Gender/Age Breakdown and Repeat Nominals













## CRIME FOCUS – Domestic Abuse (Last 3 years)



- There has been a year on year increase in the volume of Domestic Abuse related recorded crimes since 2016/17. There was a 21.03% increase in the volume of Domestic Abuse recorded crimes between 2018/19 and 2019/20, from 6,351 to 8,043.
- Cases spike at weekends and in the summer months. The majority of reports consist of violence, either with or without injury. Increases are being seen across most age groups but most noticeably in the 16-18 range and also child on parent offending. The changes to the definition and scope of domestic abuse have in part contributed to the increase. For example, the reduction of the lower age limit from 18 to 16, and the introduction of offences of controlling or coercive behaviour have affected recording levels.
- Domestic abuse related stalking and harassment is also prevalent with continued frequent contact by telephone or online continuing the controlling elements of the former relationship after it has ended. Increases are also being noted in the reporting of non-recent offending in a domestic setting but this remains less than 10%. There is no longer a time limit on abuse evidence, which previously stood at five years. Additionally, the range of documents accepted as evidence of abuse has been widened to include statements from domestic violence support organisations and housing support officers. It has been noted that investigations are tending to deal with multiple crime reports as non-recent crimes are increasingly reported as part of current investigations.





# Proactivity: How has proactive policing contributed to control strategies? (December 2020)


## Split of 619 hours appointed to FSU




## Split of 675 hours appointed to OSU

# Rural Task Force

***This report is made with the caveat that we have tried to maintain as normal a service as possible but like everyone in the country the Rural Taskforce and our partners have been affected to some degree by the Coronavirus restrictions.***

## ***Caring for the Vulnerable (Previously Reported)***

We continue to offer mental health support and signpost the interventions available to those suffering with mental health issues in rural communities.

Rural Vulnerability Forum being developed to address concerns about various aspects of vulnerability in the rural community, and how support can be given to rural victims who fall short of the threshold for support by Victim Support. There is due to be the roll out of a Pilot scheme in The Dales.

We are working through a series of mini masterclasses designed so the whole Proactive Policing department can help deliver the Domestic Abuse strand of the Control Strategy.

Property Marking events are regularly held to provide reassurance and a deterrent against theft and we are purchasing another machine to increase capacity.

## ***Ambitious Collaboration (Previously Reported)***

We are currently in the planning phase for our regular activities in 2021 such as Operation Checkpoint.

We have developed a new problem solving plan for poaching, Operation Figaro, which is being rolled out involving community protection warnings and notices.

We have had a very successful Op Galaxy working cross-border with Humberside to target cross border criminality.

We have also been working successfully with West Yorkshire to arrest rural burglars and recover stolen vehicles in Ryedale and Craven.

Operation Eyeball in October has seen us work with the local council enforcement and the Environment Agency supporting the National Metal crime week of action.

Operation Seabird is a collaboration between us, Humberside police, RSPCA, RNLI and others highlighting the issues caused by leisure craft disturbing seabird colonies on the east coast and disturbing mammals such as whales, dolphins and seals.

The team continues to work with the RSPB, Natural England and the laboratories at FERA in York and SASA in Edinburgh investigating raptor persecution.

## ***Reinforcing Local Policing (Previously Reported)***

Identify and support local priorities including proactive patrol, in particular in response to recent issues of raptor persecution across the force and rural burglaries in the Hinderwell area near Whitby.

Op Existence investigation into livestock theft and subsequent sale, OCG management and working with partners such as NFU and Environmental Health to tackle OCG. Recent arrests have been made in regards to this group and extensive enquiries are ongoing, the principal offender is back in court in April.

Members of the team have been down into Humberside on several occasions recently, arresting suspects for a series of thefts from cars in rural locations.

There has been a successful bid to the Safer Streets Fund to obtain over £500,000 for burglary prevention work initially in the Whitley Ward which we have just expanded in to the Eggborough and Kellington areas.

## ***Reinforcing Local Policing (New)***

We are working with local teams in the Helmsley and Stokesley areas along with rural watches and Cleveland police to target cross-border rural crime.

## ***Enhancing Customer Experience (Previously Reported)***

Mobile Rural Watches (MRW) are now established in all districts of North Yorkshire, their activity being collated under Op Harvester. WhatsApp is being used very successfully to support these groups and has been pioneering in both gathering intelligence and providing reassurance to communities, there are now 25 groups.


Recent successes when working with the MRW have included the discovery of a quad thief from Cleveland in the back of a van in Helmsley and the arrest of a gang of quad thieves from West Yorkshire in Wharfedale and the recovery of a quad bike in Ryedale. Internal SharePoint and Intranet sites are up and running to communicate the work of RTF to police colleagues.




### 999 Call volumes



### % answered within 10 seconds




### Average Speed of Answer





# Initial Contact - 101


### Call Volume

- Concern Safety = Concern for Safety – includes all occurrences where there is a concern for an individual's safety or welfare
- Fraud Offences = These are not included in the crime statistics as they are not reported by forces to the Home Office. Instead these crimes are passed to Action Fraud and statistics are collated by that agency
- FSU = Firearms Support Unit
- I Grade = priority assigned by control room for an incident requiring ImmEDIATE police response
- KSI = A casualty Killed or Seriously Injured as a result of a Road Traffic Collision on a public road
- MCU = Major Crime Unit
- MHA = Mental Health Act
- Miss Pers = Missing Person
- MO = Modus Operandi
- NPS = New PsychoaSubstances is the official term for Legal Highs
- NTE = Night Time Economy
- OCG = Organised Crime Group
- OSU = Operational Support Unit – a specialist unit which is deployed around the force through tactical bidding process
- OPL = Over Prescribed Limit typically the term used to describe failing a breath test
- PCSO = Police Community Support Officer
- PSW = Personal Safety and Welfare
- Resolved Outcome = A crime where an offender has been dealt with through sanction or restorative justice.
- RPG = Roads Policing Team
- RTF = Rural Task Force
- Sus Circs = Suspicious Circumstances – includes Insecure premises and Vehicles



The Officer Long-term FTE Target of 1508 is the target for March 2021; therefore, work will continue to reach the target by March 2021. \*The officer FTE budget was built using the 1451 baseline for 19-20 and adding in the phased recruitment of 58 officers for Phase 1 of Op Uplift. Due to the planned intake dates for 20-21 linked to Uplift this equated to an additional average FTE of 54.34.

The actual number of Officers has decreased by 6.60 FTE from the previous month. The number of leavers was less than projected; there were less retirees and less resignations than projected.

The next intake of Student Officers is planned for February 2021; again students will take part in the Police Constable Degree Apprenticeship (PCDA). Student Officer intakes have been amended as part of Operation Uplift. There are further officer intakes via our other routes (transferees, rejoiners and potentially officer retired/retiring returners) planned throughout the year. Whilst these are the recruitment plans, it is acknowledged that they exceed the budget. The first review has taken place, amending intakes throughout the financial year. Regular reviews will continue to take place throughout the year with affordability being one of the factors for consideration. The figures are currently 6.60 FTE below the FTE Budget.

\*The PCSO Long term Target & budget includes the FTE for a pilot with NYFRS for two Public Safety Officers in this financial year. The budget is yet to be amended to reflect this but will likely equate to a reduction in PCSO FTE of 3.5 (Salaries & associated delivery costs).

The actual number of PCSOs has decreased by 0.88 FTE. There was 1 leaver this month, the same as projected.

The next intake of PCSOs is scheduled for January 2021. As with Police Officer recruitment it is acknowledged that the PCSO projections exceed the budget. The first review of recruitment plans has taken place, amending intakes throughout the financial year. Reviews will continue to take place throughout the year with affordability being one of the factors for consideration. For example the intake number for January 2021 has the potential to be amended. The number of PCSOs looking to become student officers is another factor. This will continue to be reviewed and acted upon as the number of PCSO becoming Police Officers has increased markedly over the last 3 years. The figures are currently 6.31 FTE over the FTE budget.


