Mental Health (April 2020 - March 2021)

Occurrences with a mental health qualifier



- There has been an increase in Mental Health related incidents this month. As a result of the extended use of the auto tag facility used by the FCR, this has increased the number of mental health qualifiers applied since May 2020.
- Incidents with a Mental Health tag have accounted for 19.04% of all incidents in the last 23 months and have accounted for 21.87% of all incidents in March 2021.


Use of police custody as a place of safety


Police custody must only be used for s136 MHA detainees in highly exceptional circumstances, e.g. genuinely unmanageable risks of resistance, aggression, violence or escape, or if also detained for an offence. We scrutinise every use of custody in these circumstances.


The below volumes have been reviewed and changed. Previously any s136 detention that occurred in custody has been counted, however, all but the below incidents, custody was not actually used as a place of safety. The incident occurred whilst in custody before the individual was transferred to a recognised Health Based Place of Safety and as such custody was never used as a Place of Safety. In these cases, the mental ill-health of the detainee was identified after their arrival at a custody suite.



CRIME FOCUS – Domestic Abuse (Last 3 years)





- There has been a year on year increase in the volume of Domestic Abuse related recorded crimes since 2016/17. There was a 21.03% increase in the volume of Domestic Abuse recorded crimes between 2018/19 and 2019/20, from 6,351 to 8,043.
- The majority of reports consist of violence, either with or without injury. Increases are being seen across most age groups but most noticeably in the 16-18 range and also child on parent offending. The changes to the definition and scope of domestic abuse have in part contributed to the increase. For example, the reduction of the lower age limit from 18 to 16, and the introduction of offences of controlling or coercive behaviour have affected recording levels.
- Domestic abuse related stalking and harassment is also prevalent with continued frequent contact by telephone or online continuing the
 controlling elements of the former relationship after it has ended. Increases are also being noted in the reporting of non-recent offending in a
 domestic setting but this remains less than 10%. There is no longer a time limit on abuse evidence, which previously stood at five years.
 Additionally, the range of documents accepted as evidence of abuse has been widened to include statements from domestic violence support
 organisations and housing support officers. It has been noted that investigations are tending to deal with multiple crime reports as non-recent
 crimes are increasingly reported as part of current investigations.

Proactivity: How has proactive policing contributed to control strategies? (End of Year Update)

End of Year update by team against each control strategy, this slide provides some of the stand out highlights over the last 12 months.

Firearms Support Unit (FSU)

- Domestic Abuse A 17 year old having a mental health crisis attempted to cut their throat with a knife, FSU officers restrained her and prevented her from taking her own life. Detained under the mental health act and medical intervention commenced.
- Fraud (Personal) Two males linked to bogus official work throughout Yorkshire were arrested on the A1 and vehicle seized. Primary force was South Yorkshire Police, males detained on their behalf to facilitate the investigation. Preventative work, as they were heading into North Yorkshire.
- Serious Organised Crime Tracker activation in a rural area of Selby District FSU tracked signal to a rural industrial unit where they located a number of stolen items of plant, other stolen vehicles and a cannabis grow. Male in charge of the unit is a well-known nominal linked to organised crime over the past 20-25 years.
- Sexual Abuse and Exploitation Two South Yorkshire Police nominals arrested for crime offences in the NYP area burglary and SMV. One of the males wanted for a violent rape allegation in the South Yorkshire area male detained and forensic strategy adhered to, in order to secure and preserve evidence for the sexual offence.

Operational Support Unit (OSU)

- Domestic Abuse Officers attend address and conducted arrest of a female for assault and criminal damage, the day prior OSU officers attend a domestic incident of a male posting explicit pictures of his ex-partner on the internet. Appropriate action was taken and PPN submitted to allow follow up safeguarding to be considered.
- Fraud (Personal) OSU support other police departments in the execution of warrants. in one instance a warrant was executed where the offender had been defrauding a care home. £60000 was found hidden in a safe in the loft.
- Serious Organised Crime Members of the OSU assisted the Organised Crime Unit in the arrest of an organised crime member. Operation Dragon resulted in the arrest of a male and subsequent search of his property and scrap yard. Some 94 cars were searched and 5kg of class A drugs recovered which had been hidden in a vehicle.
- Sexual Abuse and Exploitation Operational Support Officers assisted with Operation Ankle. This was a week of action conducting warrants and subsequent searches of properties in respect to indecent images. Officers from the team recovered many exhibits for examination and in one instance recovered some class A drugs which will serve to convict that suspect of other matters.

Roads Policing Group (RPG)


- Domestic Abuse A number of offenders, who have made off from scenes of domestic abuse have been identified by ANPR research and located and arrested by RPG resources. RPG are able to offer specialist support regarding these often high risk offenders and have brought pursuit situations to safe conclusions and ensured the apprehension of suspects.
- Fraud (Personal) RPG have recently dealt with groups utilising foreign plated vehicles. These groups cold call in rural elderly communities in an attempt to fraudulently deliver services and or purchase vehicles at greatly reduced prices, by applying excess pressure to the vulnerable. These interventions have served to disrupt activity and build the intelligence picture with National and European partners.
- Serious Organised Crime RPG continue to exploit ANPR and intelligence lead tasking to target Organised Crime in NYP. Recent stops have seen an OCG uncovered in the Selby district, highlighting a number of offences including international links around the theft of plant machinery, people trafficked into modern slavery and large scale drug cultivation.
- Sexual Abuse and Exploitation RPG utilise ANPR and proactive patrol methods in order to identify opportunities to target sexual abuse and exploitation. A recent incident involved the stopping of a vehicle which contained members of an Eastern European OCG and two female sex workers, that were subject to exploitation. Both males were arrested and both females received all available support with regards safe guarding and referrals to partners for longer term support around their vulnerability.


Rural Task Force (March 2021 Update)


This report is made with the caveat that we have tried to maintain as normal a service as possible but like everyone in the country the Rural Taskforce and our partners have been affected to some degree by the Coronavirus restrictions.

- Whilst on dedicated patrol in the Craven area targeting rural crime, Rural Watch volunteers reported an attempt theft of a Quad bike at Threshfield. RTF and members of the local watch scheme found the suspect vehicle abandoned. RTF using equipment obtained through Safer Street funding, locate two suspects running across fields into woodland. With the use of other NYP resources they are located and arrested. A third male was located in the West Yorkshire area and arrested. The vehicle was on false plates. A thorough search recovered a balaclava, gloves and torch discarded in the vicinity.
- •RTF attend Leeds area to make an arrest for burglaries. Suspect located and arrested. Search of home address also lead to recovery of live ammunition.
- •RTF stop a HGV due to its manner of driving. The driver was found to be OPL. Also in the vehicle were drugs and offensive weapons. Suspect arrested for all offences and charged to court.
- A Livestock theft suspect was seen by RTF in breach of animal disqualification order. He was in possession of 7 sheep and was arrested. He had been arrested for similar offences earlier in March where RTF took primacy in the investigation. Subsequently he was charged and remanded. He has also just pleaded guilty for three other breaches RTF caught him for in June 2020. All due to be sentenced together in May 2021.
- •RTF identified suspect for two burglaries in Whitby's rural area and arranged a joint arrest with Cleveland for thefts of metal and power tools. Male charged with Burglaries and theft. Court date imminent.
- Vehicle stopped in Selby. Driver was already on bail for South Yorkshire. Power to search under the Misuse of Drugs Act formulated and passenger dealt with for cannabis. Driver has no licence and no insurance. Vehicle seized and driver reported for offences.
- •We have also conducted two cross-border rural crime operations in March 2021 targeting overnight poachers and travelling criminals on the Ryedale border jointly with the new Humberside Rural Task force. Similar operations have also been conducted with West Yorkshire police and Cleveland police, again targeting the Borders between Force area, deterring crime and providing a visible presence and reassurance to our rural communities.
- •Operation Checkpoint on 29th March along the northern border. A long running regional cross-border rural crime operation, carried out Quarterly, originally set up between NYP and Durham. This has expanded and now includes Lancashire, Cumbria, Northumbria, and Cleveland police, in addition to local volunteer Watch teams. 3 vehicles seized, 35 vehicles checked, 1 PACE vehicle search, 1 TOR (no MOT), 2 Sec 59's issued, 1 possession cannabis offence. A total of 31 Watch volunteers were out on patrol with NYP (lower than usual due to Covid rules).
- •'Safer Streets 2' farm survey work by RTF in Craven, Harrogate, and Selby Districts to provide farm data to support potential OFPCC funding bids for approx £1.4M of crime prevention funding.

The Officer Long-term FTE Target of 1508 was the target for March 2021. *The officer FTE budget was built using the 1451 baseline for 19-20 and adding in the phased recruitment of 58 officers for Phase 1 of Op Uplift. Due to the planned intake dates for 20-21 linked to Uplift this equated to an additional average FTE of 54.34.

The actual number at 01st April 2021 is 1493.17FTE against the target of 1508. This is below the planned target and work is ongoing to review projections to inform future recruitment. This work will include any trends on recruitment and resignations. The 2020-21 average officer number is 1503.46, which is less than 4.54FTE below the target for March 2021.

Moving In 2021-2022 the officer long term target increases as Op Uplift numbers increase. Therefore, the target for March 2022 is 1563 FTE with an annual officer FTE budget of 1564.






